The first CSin3 Cohort graduated in May 2016 from CSUMB and most had job offers upon graduation. This program has a high rate of minorities entering the Computer Science field: 42% of our students are women and 85% of students are Latino. These are unprecedented numbers in a local, state, and national level.

The Matsui Foundation and the Matsui Family have supported the program from the start. "Hard work, education, and opportunity can change everything," said Andy Matsui.

The Forbes Impact Awards are given out at each Summit to individuals who are leading, innovating, and pushing boundaries in their given field.


"We are focused on providing a world class education for the students of the Salinas Valley so they are prepared for 21st Century jobs," said Dr. Lewallen.

Featured student: Rafael Mendoza President of ASHC and MILE Scholar

Hartnell College recently launched the Men's Institute for Leadership and Education (MILE) Program, an exciting new initiative to support male students. While over 50% of Hartnell students are men, only 30% of Hartnell degrees are earned by males, MILE is designed to increase graduation rates and help male students achieve their full potential through financial support, leadership development and mentoring.

One of the members of the first MILE cohort is Rafael Mendoza. The MILE program helped keep Rafael in school when pressures of life were pushing him towards dropping out. With the renewed sense of self and support from the program, Rafael went on to become the President of the Associated Students of Hartnell College. Rafael added that, "as a first generation Mexican-American college student, education is the key to achieving my dream of becoming an engineer." The support provided by the MILE program has helped 100% first cohort students continue on with their education.



### Ag Business and Technology Institute Continuing to innovate

The Ag Business and Technology Institute is in the process of developing a new Strategic Plan for the Institute that will drive directions for the next several years. On December 13, 2016 the Ag Steering Committee held the first Strategic Plan Working Session with 35 Ag industry leaders, joined by Hartnell administrators, faculty and staff at the Alisal Campus.

Hatamiya Group conducted a Labor Market Index Survey to help direct focus of the Agriculture Business and Technology Institute and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) curriculum to best support the Salinas Valley's prominent agricultural industry over the next years. The highlight of the survey outcome includes skills needed in the 21st Century workforce, career in demand, technology applied to those jobs, training requirement and education necessary to be successful on the job, etc.

### Healthcare, Early Childhood Education, and Agriculture

Great strides were accomplished in 2016. Unprecedented level of collaboration between Hartnell College and CSU Monterey Bay are benefiting local students. Both institutions are laser focused on increasing student success, accelerating degree completion and working together on aligned degrees for Ag Science, Food Safety, Education and RN to BSN. Thanks to Monterey Peninsula Foundation, The Claire Giannini Fund, The California Endowment and Irvine Foundation, we will reach new milestones in this pathway work.



**The Monterey Peninsula Foundation** grant of \$500,000 will provide \$375,000 of support for pathway development and \$125,000 for increased art programming and community engagement through the Center for Performing Arts. The pathway development will focus on three areas, supporting the 2+2+1 Elementary Teacher and Early Childhood education pathway, building capacity to strengthen and scale the Nursing and Allied Health pathway, and the development of an Agriculture Pathway.

# Committed to developing the talent of our students, *continued*

**The Claire Giannini Fund** and its trustees have provided seed funding for the 2+2+1 Teacher Incubator Project and Early Childhood Education Pathways. The need for wellprepared educators is a statewide and local challenge that a collaborative between Hartnell and CSUMB are addressing. The first cohorts of 35 students are on their path toward becoming teachers of local elementary schools. Thanks to seed funding from The Claire Giannini Fund in support of the Teacher Talent Incubator Project, a second cohort will launch this Fall.

"The seed funds allowed us to hire an extra full time faculty, Dr. Mayra Almodovar, serving the cohort and the early childhood and the education programs in South County, broadening the reach and impact of the department," said Dean of Academic Affairs, Dr. Celine Pinet.

The Claire Giannini Fund for \$255,450 will enable the Foundation to support the second year budget for continuation for the South Monterey County Collaborative 2+2+1 Teacher Pathway Program.



The Salinas Valley Health Professions Pathway seeded by The California Endowment continues to build a strong local workforce. The partnership just concluded its 5th year with an employer summit that provided valuable input regarding the immediate and longer term needs of health care employers. The California Endowment's philanthropic support for the pathway has provided vital programmatic funding that has led to expanded health care workforce training opportunities through a new respiratory care practitioner program at Hartnell. The endowment has also stepped up with an additional investment to be used for strategic planning focused on sustainability and expansion of partnerships with employers in the health sector.

a) Increase the number of Math and English college ready students from regional feeder schools

**b)** Create a shared Student Momentum Database in which K-12, Community College, and University partners annually collect and analyze student data across educational sectors, as well as track and analyze the partnership's progress


The James Irvine Foundation investment will help build successful student transitions from high school to postsecondary education and into careers that feed regional economic growth.
